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
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100 YEARS OF SERVING THE COMMUNITY

Riverdale Library is located at 370 Broadview Ave.





SNAP SNEAKS A PEEK GLENN GOULD


T empo and Interpretation are the Crescendo of Understanding. In life, as in music, we are given a gift. It is up to the interpreter of the gift to enhance the subject and make the lesson or experience, lively, profound or exceptional. Sometimes, as an artist, the realm of relation to the subject extends beyond the general understanding of the masses and rests pleasantly, yet imperfectly, upon the few who understand the element of diversity and creation.

Glenn Gould lived from 1932 until 1982. He was tutored privately by his mother from 1938-

1939, attended Williamson Road Public School steps away from his home at 32 Southwood Drive - from 1939-1945 and Malvern Collegiate had the pleasure of Glenn's attendance from 1945 until 1951. In January1956 Glenn received international acclaim with the release of Bach's Goldberg Variations which were received as original and brilliant. Touring throughout North America, Russia, Germany, Sweden, Italy, Israel and the UK to name but a few, ensured all the while he was introduced to new and sometimes obscure works and he placed his genius upon the passages contained within the works. Through original expression, passionate perspective, measure and phrase, Glenn Gould raised the bar; he set new tempos, allowing for new interpretations. Through all his fame, Glenn maintained that if he had not been a musician, he would have been a writer.

As much as Glenn was a visionary genius he did have his eccentricities, his mother had taught him to sing everything he played and therefore he loved to hum while playing the piano, causing havoc for the recording studios. He insisted, while recording, that the studio be very warm. His piano was often raised on wooden blocks to meet his height requirements. And my personal favourite, Glenn would only play concerts seated upon an old chair his father had made. I personally believe that Glenn Gould's eccentricity could have in some ways been mistaken...his genius is renowned...the little preferences, I think, were a tribute to his loving parents, for they were always his loving crescendo.








URBAN EXPRESSIONS AT WORKSHOP GALLERY
