Some victims of the virus in 1976 lived in a village in the Democratic Republic of Congo not far from the Ebola River. There are five strains of the virus: Zaire, Bundibugyo, Sudan, Reston and Tai forest. Transmission of the virus is thought to be through contact with blood, secretions, the organs or the body fluids of infected sick and dead animals found in the rainforest. The human to human infection is transmitted through broken skin and mucous membranes via contaminated areas and contact with victims. The bedding, clothing and surfaces of a victim's environment, can trigger a transfer. An outbreak of Ebola is officially considered over forty-two days after the containment and end of new cases. The March outbreak is considered to be the largest since its discovery in 1976.
